

Our meeting with Mr. Jaromír Lisý, who was a participant in anti-fascist resistance, born in 1921, took place in early March 2015. Mr. Lisý was born in Prague, but the family followed his father, a professional soldier, to Slovakia, where Mr. Lisý lived until 1939. He did the final exams in the Protectorate Bohemia, in Cologne. After the holidays, he joined the University of Business in Prague. He was accommodated in the Masaryk dormitory in Dejvice, here he experienced the 17th November with all the brutality that left in him deep marks. After the closure of universities he returned to Cologne, he got a job in a factory Bayer and nodded to offer of a cooperation in the resistance. Even his father joined the resistance organization. Within a year, the activity of resistance of the fighters was divulged. Also young Lisý and his father were arrested Nov. 22, 1941. From Cologne Gestapo they were transferred to Theresienstadt for half a year, they spent Heydrichiad at Pankrác, from here they were transferred to a camp in Dresden, after the trial, which took place in Litomerice in spring 1943, they spent the rest of the time until the release in June 1944 in another German camp near Dresden.

Still very active Mr. Lisý didn't tell the story with bitterness and sadness, you can see that this is a native optimist, even in prison thinking positively, he found something beneficial on everything, meeting with fellowprisoners enriched him, he knew even kindly guards and mainly was almost always near his father, whom he morally supported.
